## A Word from Our Rabbi . . .

A shofar sounded, thunder boomed, a mountain trembled . . . and we received the Torah! In that moment, a midrash teaches that a desolate Mount Sinai burst into a bloom of flowers, bushes and trees. As I write, flowers are just beginning to bud in the Upper Valley. We await eagerly the transformation from winter and wet to green, lush, and beautiful.

How does Jewish tradition teach us to mark the unique moment in time when the Torah was given? On the holiday of Shavuot (June 8-10), we are taught to “recreate the stage” by decorating our own homes with flowers and greenery, and to eat dairy foods. Flowers and greenery mimic Mount Sinai, while eating dairy fulfills the verse that likens the study of Torah to sweetness: “Honey and milk are under your tongue” (Song of Songs 4:11).

With this backdrop and drama in mind, the Israelites proclaim, “*na’aseh v’nishma*, we will do and we will listen.” In a clutch moment, and in volunteering whole-heartedly without even yet really knowing what they were getting into, we became both the people of the book and the people who are willing to get things done. In this moment we became an action-oriented culture and religion. Belief remains important, but our actions matter the most.

We continue the important legacy of our people in many different ways – by learning, teaching, noshing, blessing, questioning, hoping, remembering, building community, and by doing!

May our hearts and homes burst into bloom this season with beauty, wisdom, growth and the capacity and strength to step forward and say, “WE WILL DO!”

## Hello from the Hebrew School Hallway!

Spring is here, and with it the “Yom Ha” chagim (holy day observances). This year we focused our Yom HaShoah observance on the idea of putting oneself in the shoes of others, as the Nazis and the gunmen in San Diego and Pittsburgh failed to do. We talked about how we treat others whom we perceive as different from ourselves, and how to help people in and beyond our congregation to feel more included and connected. That is, after all, one of the main purposes of a religious community like ours.

This week we are observing Yom Ha’zikaron, Israeli Memorial Day, that falls on the day before Yom Ha’Atzmaut, Israeli Independence Day. I asked the older students, “Why do American Jews celebrate these second two ‘YomHa’ holidays, particularly when there is so much disagreement about the policies of the Israeli government?” and, “How can Americans show support for Israel without endorsing a particular political stance?” The students came up with great responses to this question, including the importance of having a place in the world where we know Jews are always welcome, maintaining connections with Israel despite fluctuations in political winds, and knowing the land, traditions, and language of our ancestors. They are an impressive bunch, our students!

This summer I will travel to a Jewish song-leading workshop. I expect to return with lots of new techniques (and songs, of course!). Also, I will be developing emergency evacuation and shelter-in-place policies, sexual assault and abuse prevention training for the staff, and a new “Parenting While Jewish” workshop to be started in the fall of 2019. I’m very excited about this workshop and I hope you will stay tuned for details about attending it.

This year we had more community members teaching in the Hebrew School. I would like to continue and build on this trend. Although Dartmouth students are inspiring and energetic teachers, I like to have a mix of maturity, experience, connection, and continuity in the classroom. ## Finance Committee

The Finance Committee of UVJC/Kol Ha'Emek serves as a sounding board and advisor to the Treasurer through planning and overseeing financial strategies of our congregation throughout the year.

The Committee helps develop the annual budget, tracks various streams of income and expense, and helps strategize how to keep them in balance. During April-June 2019, the Finance Committee has drafted the 2019-2020 (5780) budget for review and approval our Board of Trustees.

Other issues under consideration throughout the year include how best to use our designated funds, how we might increase income (including dues, membership, contributions, investing and fundraising events), and how to reduce our expenses (more efficient business practices for collecting and spending funds).

At present, the Committee comprises four members including the Treasurer who meet for approximately two hours each month. Individuals with backgrounds in finance and money management are particularly welcome to join. We would appreciate anyone's suggestions for enhancing income and reducing expenses.
