## D'VAR HA'RAV: A WORD FROM RABBI MARK

### Sowing Seeds in the Soul's Soil

Shalom and Happy Summer! Every year, but especially this year, I enjoy the ritual of changing out the winter season's clothing. Jackets, hats, boots, skis, and boards make way for sandals, shades, and shorts! Along with the change of weather and clothing comes one of my favorite seasonal activities, gardening. Turning beds, planting seeds, delicately caring for seedlings, and finally getting them into the ground.

The garden is a perfect metaphor for summer. We can ask ourselves, and speak with friends and loved ones, about the growth trajectory we'd like to see in our lives over the next few months. Here's a few starters: "What 'spiritual seeds' do I want to plant? How can I best cultivate them? Are there any weeds that need to be pulled up? In what areas of my life do I want to grow more?" Reflecting on the spiritual garden of our lives, we might follow the advice I was given when consulting my neighbor about what I should plant: "Plant what you want to eat." Without question, each of our gardens will be different based on this advice.

Each of us is encouraged to follow the "spiritual garden plan" that best speaks to us individually.

Here's a short story from tradition which inspires us to search deep within for the seeds we want to sow in our soul's soil.

"Reb Yissachar Dov of Radoshitz traveled to see his rebbe, Reb Yaakov Yitzchak, the Chozeh of Lublin. Arriving at his rebbe's study, he said, 'Show me one general way that all of us might serve G-d.' 'One way? What makes you think there is one way? Are people all the same that a single practice would suit them all?' 'Then how am I to teach people to find G-d,' Rebbe Yissachar Dov asked. 'It is impossible to tell people how they should serve. For one, the way is the way of study; for another, the way is the way of prayer; for another, the way is the way of fasting or feasting; for another, the way is the way of service to one's neighbor.' 'Then what shall I tell those who ask me for guidance in this area?' 'Tell them this. Carefully observe the way of your own heart, see what stirs your passion for G-d and for making a meaningful impact, and then do that with all of your heart and all of your strength.'"

## COMMUNITY MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

### **VOLUNTEER BOARD OF TRUSTEES** JULY 2022 - JUNE 2023

It's time to "call it a wrap" on 5783. It has been quite a ride!

Kol Ha'Emek / UVJC exists courtesy of the energy of volunteers and interest groups. This year has been a dynamic one in this regard, similar to so many previous years. One distinguishing characteristic is that we continued our emergence from Covid as the year progressed. There were more person-to-person and group interactions. Kiddushes after services became more common and are becoming more substantial. B'nai mitzvot have returned—our B'mitzvah-palooza has 18 this year! In our school, classes are held without masks or Covid immunization records. Our committee and religious services are being held in hybrid fashion. The committees are all very active, but a description would go way over the allowable column length.

### **Some New Program Initiatives:**

1. We have reached out to the Jewish Studies Program at Dartmouth to explore ways to collaborate on programming. Learning about their interests through Lunch and Learns is our first step.
2. We are aiming for a monthly Lunch and Learn series in the year ahead. On July 8, Jeff Lubell will talk about affordable housing, an issue that is crushing economic development nationwide, and what the Town of Norwich is trying to do about it. Martha Lorden, a noted chef and food historian, has agreed to speak with us about Jewish Cooking on August 19. Feelers have been sent for talks about Jewish superstitions, the impact of Maimonides on medical care, and then there are the Jewish Studies Program faculty interests. Stay tuned!
3. We are evaluating our website and looking for new interactive software. Our software is no longer available for any more updates.
4. We have revived our pre-Covid practice of having a group of UVJC members prepare dinner for Hillel students on the last Friday of each academic quarter.
5. Dartmouth has completed an upgrading of building security with cameras and monitors so we can see and speak with people asking to enter the building. We are using our B'mitzvah-palooza to increase our routine contacts with Dartmouth Safety and Security and Hanover PD to keep them abreast of times when the capacity of our parking may be exceeded by event attendance.
6. The Social Action Committee has adopted a new initiative, called the Upper Valley Dayenu Circle. This is part of a national Jewish-based response to climate change with efforts supporting local changes in practices and policies designed to reduce our carbon footprint.

# TALK OF THE SEASON: JEWISH PRINCIPLES FOR GARDENING

Judaism has a rich history as an agriculturally-based community, and while individual agricultural laws may have lost their direct relevance for many of us, these laws still provide a wealth of values that can guide us—both in our gardens and in our explorations of the role of Judaism in our lives more broadly.

*Seder Zeraim*, the mishnaic laws related to agriculture, suggest that one's land and produce is never entirely one's own. A majority of these tractates concern the obligation to dedicate a certain percentage of one's produce to others, including *Pe'ah* ("corner") which obliges us to leave some of the harvest in our fields for those in need, and *Bikkurim* ("first fruits") which describes how our first yields should be shared.

We are also taught that our practices and actions should not harm the earth or make it more difficult for future generations to cultivate sustenance. *Shmita* (allowing the land to rest every 7 years), *Orlah* (prohibition against eating from trees that are younger than 3 years old), and *Kilayim* ("hold-

ing back" by limiting agricultural production) are all aimed at keeping the land productive and fertile for generations.

Interestingly, the first tractate—*Berakhot* ("blessings")—is not specifically agriculturally-focused, but its placement in the *Seder Zeraim* may remind us that growing food and connecting with the earth are experiences worthy of appreciation.

As you dig into your gardens or embrace the everyday activities of this summer, how will you choose to incorporate some of the *Seder Zeraim* values? Will you share something you grow or create to feed or inspire others? Will you become a steward of a piece of the earth? Will you pause to appreciate a beautiful moment in a way that feels meaningful to you?

However you choose to connect with these cultural values, may you experience a summer filled with blessings!

What can we learn from this story? At minimum, we learn "plant what you want to eat." That is, observe, practice, and engage in that which moves and animates you. That which you are passionate about will connect your spirit to the "Tree of Life," to the root of holiness, and to the Universe and the Holy One.

Rabbi Rami Shapiro adds his commentary to the story and goes a step further. "There is no one method for achieving G-d because G-d is already 'yours.' This is what the Zen people call 'looking for an ox while riding on the ox.' You already have the thing for which you are looking. What is needed is not *d'veikut*/attachment to G-d, but *da'at d'veikut*, realization of the union that already exists and always has... When it comes to spirituality, do not fall for 'one size fits all.' Find your size, and wear it proudly." ("Torah Your Way," Hasidic Tales with notes by R. Rami Shapiro, p.178-79)

Summertime is not just a time when "the living is easy." It's also a time to relax, breathe deeply, and bring more awareness to what we want or truly desire in our lives. When we do this, our soul expands and is nourished. Growth takes time. Take the time to look within to really see that which stirs your passion and infuses the mundane with energy. When it comes to gardening and our spiritual lives, indeed, one size can't fit all. As another teacher notes, we can be guided to the location of the garden, and even be given the tools we need for sowing seeds and planting. But, we must do the digging ourselves.

Grab a shovel, dig in, and let's grow together.

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## 5783 Annual Meeting Recap

On Sunday, June 11 the UVJC held its Annual Meeting for 5783, which provided a wonderful opportunity to gather together as a community and enjoy a barbecue, honor in person our Shem Tov award recipients from the past three years, recall the highlights of the past year, thank departing Board members, elect new Board members and officers, and approve the 5784 congregational budget and dues structure.

We face financial challenges in the coming year: inflation and lower membership. To avoid a double-digit dues increase, the Finance Committee, the Board, and the membership (through votes at the Annual Meeting) agreed to close the gap in the 5784 budget through an increased planned draw from the Sustainability Fund and by encouraging members who are able to increase their membership level voluntarily and/or to make an additional donation to supplement their dues. We need 1 in 10 members to increase their membership by one level this year to meet our budget. For more information, please reference the letter enclosed with this year's dues package.

Thank you for your commitment, and we look forward to seeing our strong community thrive with your support as active members, volunteers, and contributors!

### Formation of Two New Committees:

1. The Israel Affairs Committee will be a study group to examine current issues. It will be based on our experience with the Israel / Palestine Conflict Learning Series, in which a moderated series of lectures and discussions with Israelis of varied political persuasions described and discussed their views with UVJC participants.
2. The Holocaust / Anti-Semitism Committee is a response to the very concerning increase in anti-Semitic talk, actions, and violence. We need to take a more active role in offering educational content relating to the Holocaust and anti-Semitic tropes. As a Jewish institution, if we are silent, what can we expect of others?

### Old Problems and New Responses:

For our finances to work, we need to increase our dues, increase membership, or possibly both. Increasing membership is our main goal. There are many unaffiliated Jews in this area; how do we persuade them that it is in their interest to become members? We will be taking a more active approach to membership that will, if done right, involve the entire congregation as Ambassadors to the UVJC. Watch your emails, the Weekly Update, and our website for details.

We are engaging in a new paradigm for the UVJC, in which membership will be focused more on relationships rather than a menu of activities. The Board of Trustees is currently studying a book with Rabbi Mark called *Creating Sacred Communities*. It describes, with multiple examples, synagogues that have decided to invest in building relationships between members. This model is being adopted in synagogues of varied settings and of varied sizes.

Underpinning this is a practice called Listening Sessions. This is where people have introductions to various ways of being better listeners, so they really hear, take note of, and connect people with others of similar interests and passions. One of our members (Amanda Silver) has led other congregations in this community-building exercise. Amanda, Roberta Berner, and Monte Blaustein are the first members of what we will expand into a congregational Keshet

(“Connections”) group to foster and move this process forward.

What to do about our finances? Some very forward-looking officers established a Sustainability Fund Campaign when we separated from Dartmouth College. The idea was to create a fund that could fill in the gaps between annual revenues and expenses. More than \$500,000 was donated. This has met our deficits for the past 5 years and we still have sufficient funds to carry us through several more years. The Sustainability Fund was a one-time appeal to meet full-time employee salaries and benefits; we need an on-going effort now. We will activate a concentrated effort to build on our Endowment Fund. We will be asking members to sit down with us to discuss Planned Giving, or including bequests to the UVJC in your estate plans. In a nutshell, we will certainly accept cash. Items such as securities, real estate, automobiles, and precious jewels will be sold, converted to cash, and invested as soon as possible.

In addition, this past year was the first time we promoted end-of-year tax donations. We also advertised accepting end-of-year IRA distributions for contributions and for paying dues. We will also emphasize contributions into operating funds and the Endowment Fund.

### Signing Off:

This is my farewell as President. I was President of our congregation in Milton, MA for two terms. My father was a four-time President in his congregation in New Haven. When I was elected President for the first time, I spoke with him about it. His only comment was, and I quote, “Oh, Paul. They will suck you dry.” That warning has stayed with me for the past 20 years. I can say emphatically that this warning was completely unnecessary for Milton and for here. I have encountered nothing but warmth, encouragement, and a willingness to engage in productive discussions. Never problematic polemics. I have been invited into people’s lives in ways that would not have happened otherwise. I got to participate, in a most significant fashion, in helping to strengthen a Jewish community. I cannot think of a better way to spend my communal time. Thank you all for the privilege of the past two years!
